








The Finnish education system








Education division in figures

- the total number of children and students of the education division is 57,600, of whom 6 % have Swedish as their mother tongue
- 11% of all children and students have a foreign language (other than Finnish or Swedish) as their first language
- the total number of personnel of the education division is 3,900

Number of children and students






Early childhood education









Finnish early childhood education in brief 1

- the law on child day care decrees that the municipality has the duty to organise or supervise children's day to meet the needs of its inhabitants (=subjective entitlement to day care)
- a family may be entitled to child home care allowance or private day care allowance, if a child under the age of 3 is cared for at home after the termination of the parental allowance
- client fees for day care are calculated according to the family's size and income, day care may also be provided free of charge
- preschool education is free



Finnish early childhood education in brief 2

- a special characteristic of the Finnish early childhood education is the so-called educare, where day care includes care and education
- group sizes of child day care have not been set, but the number of children is in proportion to the number of staff (7→8 children over 3 years/adult, 4 children under 3 years/adult)
- a family childminder may care for up to four children
- qualification requirement for a kindergarten teacher: Bachelor of Education (kindergarten teacher) or a Polytechnic Bachelor's Degree in Social and Health Care



Early childhood education in Turku

For children under school age, Turku provides day care

- in a nursing facility organised by the city: it may be a day care centre, family day care, or joint family day care
- in private day care subsidised by private day care allowance, provided by a private family day care nurse, or a home childminder
- in private day care with a service voucher
- child home care allowance for a child under 3 years of age cared for at home preschool education
 - for 6-year-old children
 - in day care or school facilities
- playground activities
 - activities supervised by playground attendants for 1,5–6-year-olds



Early childhood education in figures

Municipal day care

- 5,500 children, of whom 6% have Swedish as mother tongue
- personnel: 1,400
- 3-stage support for growth and development: basic-enhancedspecialist support

Private day care

• 1,400 children, of whom 11,5% have Swedish as mother tongue

Child home care allowance

2,100 children



Finnish basic education in brief 1

- Iocal curricula are based on the national core curriculum
- municipalities are in charge of schools
- the principle of the nearest school: choice of school based on residence
- mostly, children travel to school independently
- equal learning opportunities for all irrespective of residence or social background
- pupil welfare, aiming at supporting the child's and young person's welfare and offering early support
- a pupil welfare group in every school
- health care services in every school



Finnish basic education in brief 2

- heterogeneous classes (sex, school success, cultural background)
- teaching offered based on everyone's own starting points
- learning differences between poor and good performers are relatively small in international comparisons
- completely free of charge
- a daily hot meal
- qualification requirement for teachers:
 - in primary school: higher university degree, classroom teacher
 - in secondary school: higher university degree; subject studies that include teaching practice



Basic education in figures

Turku offers to school children between 7 and 16 years

- grades 1–9, and an optional 10th grade
- 3-stage support for pupils: basic-enhanced-specialist support
- multicultural teaching
- pupils 12,800, of whom 8 % have Swedish as their mother tongue
- 12% of all pupils have a foreign language (other than Finnish or Swedish) as their first language
- the most common foreign languages are Arabic, Russian, Somali and Kurdish
- personnel: 1,380
- 38 comprehensive schools

Finnish general upper secondary education

- each basic education graduate is guaranteed a place in an upper secondary school, vocational institution, apprenticeship training, workshop, rehabilitation or elsewhere (=guarantee of education)
- mostly free of charge
- a daily hot meal
- student welfare
- health care services in every school
- qualification requirement for upper secondary education teachers: higher university degree; subject studies that include teaching practice
- qualification requirement for vocational education teachers: field-specific variation, generally an applicable university degree, teacher's pedagogical studies and three years of work experience in a position matching the subject taught



General upper secondary education

Turku offers to young people between 16 and 18 years of age

- general upper secondary education, lasting 3 to 4 years
- teaching based on courses
- aiming at upper secondary certificate and matriculation examination
- provides a qualification for academic studies
- 6 specialist upper secondary schools: specialist fields are sport, theatre and visual arts, ICT, music, marine-oriented programme and natural sciences
- the English-language upper secondary school of Turku International School and the IB studies at Turun normaalikoulu offer upper secondary education in languages other than Finnish or Swedish



General upper secondary education in figures

- 6 daytime upper secondary schools and one evening upper secondary school
- students in daytime upper secondary schools 3,320 and in the evening upper secondary school, aiming for a degree, 365, students also in subject studies
- 8 % of students have Swedish as their mother tongue
- personnel: 260
- 53% of those who completed basic education in Turku started upper secondary education (cf. 40% started vocational education)

Vocational education

- Turku Vocational Institute, one of the largest upper secondary education institutions in Finland
- 20 basic-education-based qualifications and 8 secondary-education-based ones
- education and training includes a total of 6 months of on-the-job learning
- a qualification can also be completed as apprenticeship training
- education in business and IT also in Swedish
- possibility to complete a matriculation examination, a so-called dual or double degree
- course in home economics, careers guidance and preparative training (= job start, ammattistartti), rehabilitative instruction, preparatory education for young immigrants for vocational training
- professional competitions, Skills competitions, on Finnish, European and World Championships levels
- athletes' education
- student services sold



Vocational education and training in figures

- about 1,500 starter places
- primary applicants 1,800 (in spring 2015)
- students 3,840
- apprenticeship students 2,200
- personnel: 410
- 6 offices in Turku
- 40% of basic education graduates in Turku started vocational education (cf. 53% started upper secondary education)



Finnish adult education in brief

- adult education is diverse: general, voluntary self-development, vocational qualifications and further training, personnel training in work life, employment training
- several different education and funding options
- basic, further and specialist vocational upper secondary qualifications are completed as competence-based qualification (=competence is demonstrated in actual work duties)
- vocational skills are demonstrated in competence-based qualifications by demonstrations, irrespective of whether the applicant has acquired his or her competence and skills through work, studies or hobbies



Adult education

Turku provides for adults

- adult education with no age limits
- students are primarily 25 to 55 years old

Vocational adult education

- independent and labour market training towards approximately 65 vocational basic, further and specialist vocational upper secondary qualifications
- vocational further training, training in choice of a career, language and cultural training and further training in education

General adult education

- Turku Adult Education Centre
- Åbo svenska arbetarinstitut Turku Swedish-speaking Adult Education Centre



Adult education in figures

- adult students annually 6,600
- 15,700 student places in Turku Adult Education Centre annually
- 2,500 student places in the Turku Swedish-speaking Adult Education Centre annually
- personnel: 180

Towards further studies and working life

Eligibility for further studies

 completing general upper secondary education, a matriculation examination, basic, further or specialist vocational qualification provides a general eligibility for further studies in polytechnics as well as higher academic institutions of science and the arts

Lifelong learning

- work life and professions change quickly
- competence must be maintained, irrespective of educational background
